<u>Identification</u>: Slender-bodied viper with prehensile tail, reaching a total length of 1 m. Broad triangular head. Coloration is entirely bright green, sometimes becoming blue. Small yellow and black bands on sides of back and flanks, more or less visible.

<u>Range</u>: This species occurs in Central America and is found from Costa Rica to western Panama.

Habitat: Lower montane humid and cloud forests, rarely in plantations.

<u>Behavior</u>: The species is mostly arboreal and is often found in low vegetation near watercourses. Mostly active by day, feeds on lizards and rodents. Viviparous.

<u>Status in the wild</u>: The species has a relatively small range but remains locally common throughout. It's known to occur in protected areas.

<u>In captivity</u>: The species is commoner in captivity than most members of its genus but remains fairly rare. In Europe, it's currently kept in a single zoo and some private collections. Commoner in American zoos. Bred mostly by private breeders.
